- 1984 40th birthday (Norman, OK). Baring-Gould *Annotated Sherlock Holmes*1st time I ever encountered the name John Bennett Shaw was in the *ASH*.
 Began to hear his name on NPR interviews during the January BSI weekends. Reporters loved to seek him out for interviews. I also read the New York Times (Sunday Edition) where I found interviews with Shaw.
- 1985 Moved to Nashville to become a music consultant for Baptist Sunday School Board and begin attending our summer retreats in Ridgecrest, NC near Asheville, and Glorieta, near Santa Fe, NM.
- 1986 My first visit to Shaw's home in Santa Fe
- 1987 Joined Nashville Scholars scion society
 - Attended Williamsburg, VA. The Sherlock Holmes Centenary John Shaw Sherlockian Weekend
- 1988 1994 Several other visits to Santa Fe and the Shaw's, summer and fall.
- 1994 Shaw dies in October, one week short of his 81st birthday
- 1995 January. I learn of Shaw's death from Nick Potter, a local Santa Fe bookseller. In October I attended the dedication of the John Bennett Shaw Collection at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis.
- 1997 Termination of employment with BSSB

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- 1998 I begin my web design business
- 1999 I build the Nashville Scholars website and share a page about knowing John Bennett Shaw.

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- 2001 I begin employment with Southwest Airlines, and do very little with Sherlock Holmes hobby
- 2016 First emails from Peter Blau and Mattias Bostrom arrive. I begin my retirement sequence from Southwest, planning for June 18, 2017.
